Spring Programs at Jamestown: Kicking off the excavation season and marking the anniversary of the beginning of Jamestown

JAMESTOWN, VA (March 26, 2025) -

On April 4, 1993, Dr. Bill Kelso pushed a shovel into the soil near the Church Tower on Jamestown Island and officially began the Jamestown Rediscovery Project. Almost 400 years earlier, in the spring of 1607, the men of the Virginia Company first spotted land after their fourmonth journey across the ocean and stepped onto a swampy peninsula "in Paspiha's [Paspehegh] country." (George Percy) Join Jamestown Rediscovery this spring to commemorate both of these remarkable moments in history.

Archaeology Opening Day: Saturday, April 12

Just over 30 years ago, archaeology proved the site of the 1607 James Fort was on dry land, not lost to erosion as myth portrayed since after the Civil War. Join Jamestown Rediscovery archaeologists to kick off the 2025 archaeology season at Jamestown! This year, archaeologists will tackle several sites that are at risk of damage due to increasing flooding. Learn how you can

help save artifacts and features before they're lost. See archaeology in action just outside the Archaeology Museum, go on a walking tour to learn about recent finds, and get hands-on with real artifacts in the Ed Shed.

Jamestown Day: Saturday, May 17

After sailing 60 miles up the James River, on May 14th, 1607, the Virginia Company landed at a swampy peninsula that would give them good views of any ship that may come upriver and decided to establish their settlement on a swampy, unoccupied peninsula "in Paspiha's country" (George Percy). Join us to commemorate this pivotal moment that set in motion the events that would build the foundation of America. Jamestown Day programming includes walking tours with historians and archaeologists, living history that takes visitors back to the 17th century, and archaeology in action near the site of Jamestown's last Statehouse. Plus, visitors of all ages can explore ground-penetrating radar and touch real artifacts in the Ed Shed.
